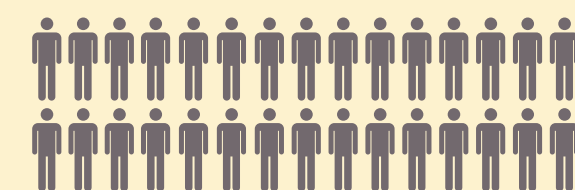


WORKING TO ADDRESS BULLYING IN FINGAL



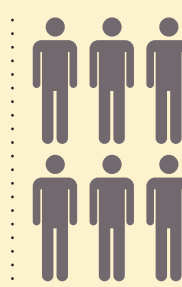
The **ABI Anti Bullying Wellbeing Programme** for primary schools is an annual programme that teaches children how to make correct behavioural choices.

Last year I was delighted to bring ABI and Fingal County Council together. I would like to thank our CEO, Paul Reid, and Director of Services Margaret Geraghty for agreeing to provide funding so that the scheme could be introduced on a pilot basis into 7 schools in Fingal. The ABI Programme is now reaching it's final implementation phase in the 7 Fingal primary schools and is due to complete at the end of April.



Almost **3500 children**

AND Up to 300 teachers will have been **trained** in best practice methodologies for Anti Bullying prevention and intervention by April



OVER 600 parents

will have attended information sessions on how to support their children and school as they roll out the programme. The programme focuses on empowering young children to make 'feel good' choices in their friendships and groups that will impact positively on their mental health and wellbeing.



I visited schools that have participated and the **response from both teachers and students has been hugely encouraging**. Fingal have played their part in making a difference to the thousands of children that have participated.

There are still **further 16 Fingal primary schools** that have signed up for the programme and it's hoped that further funding will become available from the Department of Education or other sources to ensure that all the schools who wish to participate are not denied this worthwhile programme due to lack of funding.

I will continue to work with the **ABI** to ensure that we all do whatever we can to secure the funding necessary for the rest of the schools in Fingal to have the benefits of this wonderful programme.

DUBLIN AIRPORT'S COMMUNITY FUND RE-OPENS FOR APPLICATIONS



Dublin Airport's Community Fund officially re-opened for applications on **February 1st** for a **six-week period**. The airport's €10 million Community Fund was launched last summer with an **annual investment of €400,000**.

Support is focused on areas such as



environment and sustainability



social inclusion and community development



health and wellbeing



sports and recreation



culture and heritage

The Community Fund supports projects in the neighbouring communities around Dublin Airport. Organisations such as **voluntary groups or clubs, resident associations** from local communities and **schools and colleges can apply**. Over 100 applications were received when the fund opened last September and sixty organisations that met the eligibility criteria were subsequently approved by the Grant Making Panel.

Among the projects funded in the last round of approved applications were new sports equipment for Kinsealy United FC, materials to help Swords Woodland Association deliver its Agenda 21 Biodiversity Workshops to schools and a juvenile training facility for Starlights GAA Club in Cloghran.

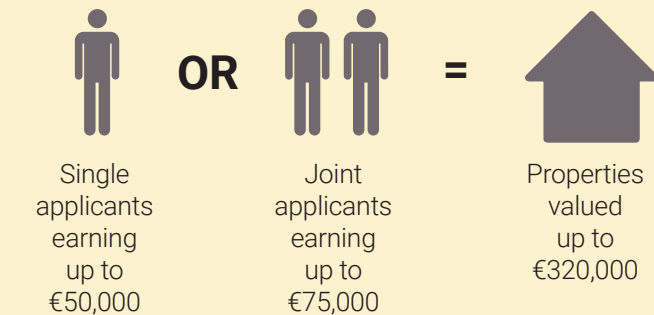
CLOSING DATE: MARCH 16TH 2018

For many years Dublin Airport has supported community initiatives in areas such as sports, education, literacy and the arts. Organisations and activities that have previously been supported include; St. Margaret's GAA Club, Naomh Mearnóg GAA Club, Swords and Malahide Young Musician of the Year competitions and Fingal Libraries' Battle of the Book reading programme.

Organisations can apply for grants under three different headings, minor grants of €5,000 or less to suit smaller initiatives, major grants of €5,000 or over for projects that have medium or long-term benefits, and capital grants for the purchase of equipment or the improvement or construction of buildings. HOUSE PURCHASE LOAN SCHEME NOW OPEN FOR APPLICATIONS FROM FIRST TIME BUYERS

Fingal County Council has opened applications for the House Purchase Loan Scheme for first-time buyers launched by the Department for Housing in recent weeks.



Buyers can use the loan to purchase new or second hand properties and can **borrow up to 90%** with **fixed repayments** over a **thirty year period at 2%**. As a Councillor constantly dealing with people who are not in a position to obtain mortgages I welcome the Rebuilding Ireland Home Loan Scheme. It allows Fingal County Council to offer further support to first time buyers looking for a home in Fingal.

The introduction of the House Purchase Loan Scheme will be significant for middle-income earners who otherwise are finding it extremely difficult to buy a house. It offers residents sustainable and realistic interest rates on their mortgage.

These remain fixed at 2% over the entire course of the repayments. This not only makes it easier for first time buyers to access the housing market but also helps them to manage their mortgage payments.

This will be hugely beneficial to Fingal residents who are currently stuck in the private rental sector. The Scheme allows people to buy their first home in an area of their choice without having to sacrifice their quality of life or struggle with unmanageable debt.
